Hear from Diana how her diploma and her continuing education experiences with RP through the Alumni Skills Advancement Programme have helped her in her current work.

Q What are you roles and responsibilities at work?

A My roles and responsibility as a Manager at Network Management is to engage the Specialist/ Physiotherapist/Psychologist to join our panel. During the onboarding process we will conduct training for providers in our panel and hold on any external meetings if required. At times if there is case escalation, will step in to assist and manage the providers expectations.















- Q How is this diploma helping you in your current work and career development?
- The in-depth learning in this course eventually allows me to explore healthcare not only in a conventional approach but in the telehealth industry too. Especially when I meet the doctors or psychologists across the speciality, I can understand the core concept of their practice. This allows me to explain better to the doctors & psychologist before joining the panel. The Biomedical Science course has also honed my critical thinking, communication and teamwork skills, and allowed me to grow broader in my professional network and resources to explore the healthcare industry confidently.
- What was it like being a student again?
- A Attending the ASAP courses has allowed me to enrich further and use them wisely at my work. Especially using data analytics is necessary at work.
- How are you balancing work, studies, and family?
- A Time management and support from my family are the key factors. Follow by setting time to do some voluntary activities at a grassroot organization allows me to release my stress. It gives me internal happiness and allows me to visualize different perceptions of life. 






## Ace Your Virtual Interview

Virtual interviews have become a new norm for companies seeking to hire. Here are some of the dos and don'ts to help you navigate your virtual interview and (with luck!) land a job.





### Test the video platform's audio and video functions

Whichever the platform your interview will be hosted on, make sure you can log on with ease. Do a quick test of your audio and video functions to ensure they are both working well. This allows you to troubleshoot any issues before the actual interview.



### **Check your Internet connection and camera settings**

Make sure you have a strong Internet connection. A spotty Wi-Fi could cause your replies to be halfdelivered. Set up your camera so you can be seen from the waist up and look straight into the camera so that you appear to be addressing the interviewer directly.



### Be strategic about where you conduct the interview

Find a private space where you can chat quietly and without distractions. Make sure the lighting is good and have a clean, presentable backdrop.



#### Look and sound the part

Dress professionally and speak with a calm, pleasant tone. Let your personality shine through by smiling and being amiable.





















#### Go in unprepared

Like any other interview, don't go in without doing your research. Doing so shows your interest in the company and helps to make a more meaningful connection.



#### Be too casual

You may be in your comfort zone but don't lose sight of the fact that it's a job application. Avoid being too relaxed, which may give you the impression that you don't care.



#### Read off your screen

Reading out answers is not okay even if interviewers can't see you. You'll probably sound awkward, so use cue cards instead to act as reminders.



#### Lose focus

Make sure to turn off the TV, silence your mobile phone and close the window or door to reduce any noise. Take steps to avoid any potential interruptions.







### Tell us more about your current student life at SUTD.

As an emerging engineering education institution, SUTD is very different from other local universities, which focus on conventional lecture-based teaching. In SUTD, we are immersed in an one-of-a-kind, design-centric interdisciplinary curriculum, delivered through hands-on, small class based active learning.

All freshmen in Engineering Product Development (EPD) study a set of common modules, which include Math Modelling, Applied Physics, Programming, Design Thinking and Social Science. Thus, we can fully explore our interests before deciding on our major from the second year. We are assigned to or self-form a group for each individual subject (1D) and a cross-subject project (2D) every trimester. For most of the projects, students are given the freedom and facilities support.

SUTD has also offered me a Global Merit Scholarship, which covers my tuition fees and subsidises an overseas exchange stint to top engineering universities like Stanford and UC Berkeley. I am very much looking forward to that overseas experience. I am currently the President of SUTD Table Tennis Club. All student clubs in SUTD organise a variety of activities for members to participate in after class. These events make the culture in SUTD very vibrant and cohesive.
















### Q2 What are your plans after graduating from SUTD?

I think I'd like to be an Integrated Circuit Design Engineer in the semiconductor industry, or continue to study PhD in the field of Microelectronics or Semiconductor Material.

## What are some of the things you have learnt in RP that have helped smoothen your transition to university life?

There are many hands-on projects in EPD, and the practical skills I've picked up in RP, such as how to connect electrical circuits and how to troubleshoot, are really important for making successful prototypes. Besides that, the theoretical

knowledge gained from modules such as Advanced Mathematics, Circuit Analysis and Semiconductor Material in RP stand me in good stead as I acquire deeper theoretical knowledge in university.

My experience from the days of being the DEEE Ambassador and Vice-Captain of RP Table Tennis IG also helped hone my leadership skills and made me more adaptable to team members of various personalities.


















## Q4 How was your FYP experience when you were back in RP?

My FYP experience was really unforgettable. My project involved designing and fabricating a self-powered inertial sensor in collaboration with a research group from the National University of Singapore. The project work was eventually published in Nano Energy journal.

Teamwork and task allocation are important as we were only given one day per week in each semester to complete the FYP. Every team member needs to try their best to complete their work by communicating regularly on the progress of their tasks and supporting one another. Through my FYP, I have learnt how rigorous and scientific research work should be and how to apply the knowledge to our life in a meaningful manner.

## Any advice(s) for your DEEE juniors aspiring to pursue further studies in universities?

First, pay attention and think independently in class. Second, always consult your lecturers if you do not understand the lesson. Third, have proper time management so that you have sufficient time for revision before the exams.

In addition to academic results, local universities value a student's soft skills as well. Therefore, while working to achieve the GPA requirement, active participation in various programmes, such as DEEE Ambassador and co-curricular activities like IG, Service Learning, will help in your university application.

# Turning his life around in KP

Max Ong Yeow Loong, 24, recently graduated from Republic Polytechnic's Diploma in Human Resource with Psychology and is currently enrolled in

## SMU's Business Management course, which he picked over offers from NUS and NTU.

Life seems like a bed of roses for now, but just a few years ago, Max's life threatened to take a completely different turn.

When Max was in secondary school, he struggled with his studies. Brought up by a single mother who worked two jobs to

make ends meet, Max was lonely and often left to his own devices.

"I was a crappy secondary school kid," Max admits. "When I went to school I slept in class. I'll just go to school for PE (and) after PE I will just run out of class. I will just run out of school."

In 2012, Max did badly for his O levels. He did not qualify for a polytechnic and was

















not keen on going to the Institute for Technical Education.

He spent the next three years of his life without a clear purpose, floating from one odd job to another as a waiter, flyer distributor, telemarketer and even an enforcement officer for the National Environment Agency.

Then, at age 19, Max enlisted in National Service (NS), which proved to be a turning point in his life.

Firstly, the army motivated him to work and live better. "With a very regimented lifestyle and surrounded by a very different group of people I gained new insights and new ideas and developed (into) a new character," Max said.

Secondly, Max received a letter from his mother. "The first sentence was – I remember word for word – 'Dear Loong, Ma cannot write well'. That just broke me. It made me realise that... although

she couldn't give much, she gave what she could. And from then on I realised not to waste any chance that is presented to me." He then decided to retake his O levels and did well enough to qualify for RP.

It was at RP where life finally gave him a break, although the journey was far from smooth.

To make ends meet, Max had to juggle a weekend job with his studies. In addition, he was 21 when he started Year 1, so he was significantly older than his classmates. Despite the age gap and differences in values and opinions, he was undaunted. "I figured that there's no way I can make 100 people change for me. So I just have to change for that 100 people to be able to fit in."

Not only did Max finally fit in with the rest of his cohort, but he also blossomed as a leader and inspiration to others. He was in the exco committee of SMC Club,

and was an active member of RP's Service Learning Club.

Mr Charleston Goh, one of Max's lecturers in RP, has nothing but praise for him. He said: "It is hard to state all the valuable contributions that Max has made to our school and the surrounding community. Pushing through adversity with lots of resilience and a big smile, Max constantly makes the impossible possible."

Indeed, Max achieved what once seemed impossible – a place in university. He is grateful to his time in RP for helping him reach that goal.

When asked what he will remember most from RP, he said: "The process of growing as a person, as a student, as a better friend. The friends you make along the way, the memories... how you contribute to the school that gives you this sense of belonging."













# How can we give back as Alumni?



We sat with Aaron Yeo, an RP Alumnus who graduated with a Diploma in Biomedical Sciences (DBMS) in 2007. He was the second batch of students to graduate from RP.

Aaron recently contributed \$6,000 to the School of Applied Science (SAS) student bursaries. Speaking about the importance of constant reflection, he acknowledged that the journey he has been on and people he met have shaped him to be who he is today.

"I am always thinking about how I can contribute back," Aaron explained. "In the past, some of my schoolmates dropped out of school because of financial difficulties. Unfortunately, these were bright students - if they had been given financial support, the funds would have gone a long way."

"I realise this is a very trying period," he continued. "If my contribution can help even one student tide over through the end of polytechnic study, that would be very gratifying for me."















Aaron also encouraged recent graduates and alumni members to continue the search for the right career.

"No matter how difficult your situation is, find something to look forward to, and hold on to your dream. Even if it is currently difficult for you to pursue your goal right away, retain that aspiration and find alternative ways to get there."

He also encouraged more Alumni to support needy students.

"As an individual, there is a limit to what I can contribute. How do we make our efforts scalable? Connect with like-minded individuals. I imagine there is a wide pool of graduates willing to give. Sometimes, learning how to give back not in our active consciousness."




COVID-19 has affected the lives of everyone. For RP alumni, Ron Tan, the pandemic significantly reduced the number of available job opportunities in the performing field.
